What Is It?

A Workshop for graduate student TAs developed and taught by postdoctoral scholars.

Goal is to prepare future faculty (current graduate TAs) to teach effectively by establishing a positive and inclusive classroom climate.

- Postdocs work in groups of 3-4 to facilitate the workshop using case studies and other active learning methods.
- The workshop is offered every academic quarter.
- Postdocs train other postdocs to become facilitators in subsequent quarter.

How Did the Program Emerge?

- Concern about loss of talented students from STEM disciplines (lack of diversity in STEM disciplines) → need to change how we are teaching → change the training of future faculty, i.e., today's Tas.
- 1. Postdocs are in a unique position to contribute to the development and facilitation of TAs.
- 2. Many postdocs wish to pursue career in academe, but formal training in teaching and working with TAs do not exist.
- 1. Most college and universities and private sector employers expect that job applicants have an awareness of diversity and can express contributions to diversity.

What Is It – Really – What Needs Does It Address?

- 1. Training Program for graduate Tas
- 2. Professional Development Program for Postdocs:

By developing and teaching a workshop to improve teaching skills of TAs, post docs:

- → develop understanding of diversity and equity at the university
- → hone ability to cohesively express contributions to diversity at job interviews
- → learn how to develop a course that uses active learning techniques
- → improve teaching and mentoring skills
- → think about and practice how to teach effectively
- → learn how to prepare graduate students to become effective TAs

By training the next generation of trainers, postdocs:

→ hone team working and leadership skills

How Was It Put Together

- Associate Dean, faculty responsible for TA Training and postdocs met to develop framework and learning objectives.
- CIRTL (cirtl.net): provided course on diversity and other resources.
- Postdocs developed and taught workshop.
- Formative and summative evaluation used to fine-tune workshop.

How Do We Know That The Program Is Effective?

Three Explicit Goals

- 1. Creating a meaningful professional development program for postdocs *Metrics*:
- job interview success
- Continuing engagement of postdocs in divisional educational efforts
- Postdocs seeking additional professional development opportunities
- 2. Preparing TAs to teach in an inclusive manner *Metrics*:
- Pre- and post-workshop questionnaires; eval survey at end of quarter
- direct observation in classroom by TA trainer
- 3. Ensuring sustainability of the program
